For me, being a *Peer Support* mentor isn't just about sharing classroom strategies; it's also about using my own story to encourage new Indigenous teachers to keep going, no matter what.

I grew up in Fort McPherson, NT in a culturally rich family talented in beading, sewing, and preparing traditional foods. In 1992, I completed grade 11 in residential school, then started a family.

In 2002, my educational journey began at the Aurora College Teacher Education Program and continued at the University of Saskatchewan Indian Teacher Education Program. I now have my BEd, and I recently applied to the Lifelong Learning Cohort Masters Program at the University of Saskatchewan.

The first few years teaching were difficult: I had no experience and few professional resources to rely on. New teachers need a mentor. My message is, if I can do it, so can you; let me show you how. Teachers guide the next generation, and that's hard work. Thank you, Indspire, for creating this vital program.
