Why Support Matters



Financial constraints remain a major barrier to academic success for Indigenous students.



Nearly two-thirds of BBF recipients worked while studying, averaging about 17 hours per week.

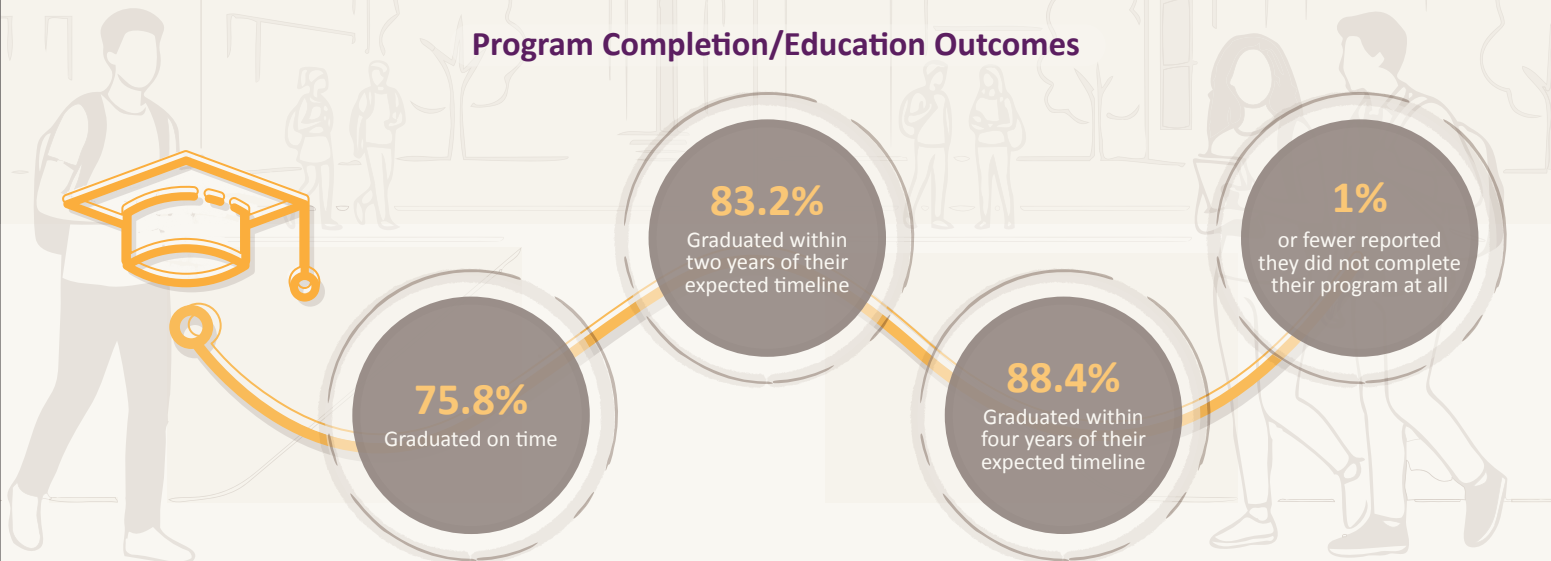


80.9% of students who worked did so to cover basic expenses.

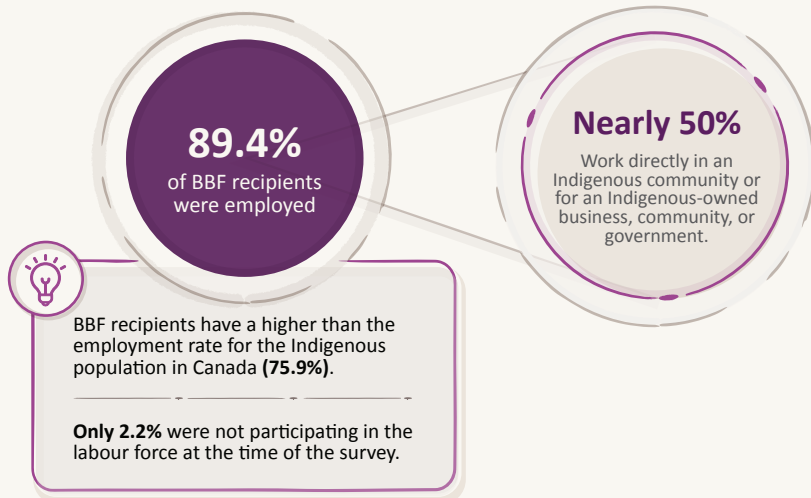


The strongest positive effect of receiving a BBF award was that it **allowed students to spend more time focusing on their studies.**
