



Supporting Indigenous Caregivers Through Their Post-Secondary Experience

This report identifies the needs of BBF applicants and recipients (between 2017-2020) who are caregivers (n=805). Nearly one third of all Building Brighter Futures: Bursaries, Scholarships, and Awards (BBF) applicants and recipients are caregivers responsible for at least two dependents (children, Elders, partners, etc.)



KEY TAKEAWAY

The findings of this study are useful as proof-of-concept to advocate for increased funding for Indigenous caregivers in PSE, with a focus on targeted mentorship.

"[T]he Building Brighter Futures Award has given me [the] opportunity to support my family and provide a roof over their head for the duration of a semester. Without the award, financially supporting my children ... would have been almost next to impossible. It provided a financial cushion throughout the academic year."

To meet at least 25% of caregiver's need, an increase of **\$4,892,890** in funding for caregivers (**\$1,091 per award**) is required.

Areas of study lacking funding

Academic Upgrading, Business, Interdisciplinary Studies and Law, had the fewest awards allocated for caregivers. They have an increased average financial need average of **\$5,194** compared to those with no dependents.



Heightened financial constraints

Over half of caregivers recipients stated the BBF award helped to relieve financial burdens, whether alleviating the stresses of supporting a family, or helping with rent or childcare.
